This plan is submitted for the purpose of obtaining Board approval of a School District sponsored extended field trip.

1. Date & Time of the Field Trip:

Option 1: Spring Break 2024

Option 2: Summer 2024 June 3-10

2. Location: (Where will you go?) Costa Rica (see attached for itinerary)

3. Selection of students: Students will be allowed to participate as long as they are enrolled in Spanish 1-4 during the 2022-23 school year. I will take no more than 36 students and if I must limit the number of enrollments it will be based on who pays the

deposit first.

4. Educational Objective(s) & Follow-up Upon Return: Throughout this trip we will be visiting cities and sites we study every year in Spanish class. Student travel is the most beneficial way to spark interest and passion in the language. It is the perfect way to immerse my students in the language and culture and they will return from Spain with a greater appreciation of the culture that we study every day. They will also return with a more confident attitude in the classroom and a greater comfort level speaking the

5. Transportation: We will travel to Costa Rica by plane and while there we will travel

via chartered bus

6. Additional Supervision: (Will you need additional supervision/chaperones? How will these additional supervisors be selected?) There will be one chaperone per 6 travelers. Supervisors will be the Spanish teacher/s and if we need more, other teachers and parents will be called upon to help.

7. Financial Arrangements: (Will there be any collection of money? How much per student? What does it pay for? Who is responsible for receipts? Will cash be accepted? If yes, how will it be handled? What arrangements have been made for students whose

parents cannot afford the costs

All payments will be made through EF Tours. Deposits will be paid and parents will have the option to purchase trip insurance at that time. The trip is estimated to cost \$2800-\$3,000 depending on when we get approval and are able to collect deposits. This includes transportation, all activities, hotel and breakfast and dinner every day. The amount does not include cost of the passport, lunch daily, tips and gratuity for directors and the optional security plan. The students will also be advised to arrange to bring \$30

spending money per day. There will be several fundraising opportunities beginning this

year which will help off-set the cost of the trip.

8. Safety Plan: (Have you researched the site to be visited? What are the risks of physical harm to students? What "reasonable means" will you employ to deal with each risk?) I have done extensive research on all areas to be visited and all are very safe places to travel. The greatest risk we will face is pick-pocketing which is common in some areas of Costa Rica but there are tricks we can employ to keep this from happening. We will spend a great amount of time before the trip discussing rules and procedures to keep our group safe. Emergency plans will be set in place and we will discuss our concerns and create a "what to do" list before we ever leave. The travel company also has a indepth security plan in place. This will be my third trip to Costa Rica following the same itinerary and I am confident in the safety of the areas we will be going to. EF Tours also offers and on-site emergency service team and has an office in Costa Rica. Special Covid procedures are in place and offer the students special lodging should they test positive for Covid while abroad. A chaperone will stay behind with the child and lodging and additional meals will be provided at no additional cost. If the student becomes seriously ill, a parent will be flown to Costa Rica at the expense of EF.



Day 1: Fly to Costa Rica

Arrive In San José

Touch down in San José. Foundad in 1737 as "Villa Nueva de la Boca Del Monte del Valle de Abra," the city's name was later abbreviated in honor of its patron saint: "San José." Guided hike through Tortuguero National Park

Join your guide for a hike into Tortuguero National Park - the place to be for turtle watching, Tortuguero is the most important Caribbean breeding ground for the green sea turtles, who have lived here for over 100 million years! Stop by Hacienda Pozo Azul today where you will take a tour of their organic garden and learn to cook some Costa Rican specialties. Afterward, enjoy your masterpieces with an included lunch.

Zip lines unveil one of the planet's most fascinating ecological systems from a unique perspective - from the tops of the trees! With local expert guides at your side to instruct you on safety protocol, you can decide which view you prefer - from below the trees or from above. (Note: This activity reaches heights of 90 feet and is not recommended for trayang with a fear of heights. Trevales much set to the process of the second recommended for anyone with a fear of heights. Travelers must weigh below 200lbs to participate.)

Day 5: Sarapiqui | Arenal region

Travel to the Arenal region

This morning you'll journey across the Central Valley to the magnificent Arenal region. Dormant for centuries, Arenal volcano exploded in a massive eruption of molten lava and ash in 1968. After continuously spewing great clouds of ash and occasional lava, this volcano has been seemingly dormant since 2010. Volcanologists from all over the world come here to study this tropical volcano.

Kayaking on Lake Arenal

Enjoy a breathtaking view of the Arenal volcano during a kayaking excursion across the lake. 

- 149 to 110 days prior to departure: Full refund less the \$95 non-refundable enrollment fee, all Non-Refundable Fees, and a \$100 substitution fee.
- 109 days or less prior to departure: Replacements can no longer be accepted and EF's Standard Cancellation Policy will apply.

^{**} Cancellation with replacement refers to a traveler who cancels but finds a person to replace them for the same program. The replacement's Enrollment Form must be submitted at the same time as the notification of cancellation.
