

Internet, Network, and Electronic Acceptable Use Policy for Staff

BP – 2110
Adopted 03/08/2010
Updated 04/18/2011

All WBOCCSC faculty and staff understand and agree to the following:

1. The use of WBOCCSC Network and Internet access (Network) is a privilege, which may be revoked by WBOCCSC at any time for abusive conduct. Such conduct would include but not be limited to, the placing of unlawful information on the system, and/or defamatory, abusive, obscene, profane, sexually oriented, threatening, harassing, racially offensive, illegal material subscribed to or received by the user, or any violation of Corporation rules or policies. Additionally, conduct that embarrasses, harms, or in any way distracts from the good reputation of WBOCCSC and its faculty and staff, or any organizations, groups, and institutions with which the WBOCCSC is affiliated is also deemed abusive. The superintendent will be the sole arbiter of what constitutes abusive conduct as described above.
2. The WBOCCSC Administration reserves the right to review any digitally stored material and will edit or remove any material, which the Administration, in its sole discretion, finds to be in violation of this agreement.
3. All information services and features contained on the Network are intended for the educational use of its patrons, and any commercial or unauthorized use of those materials or services, in any form, is expressly forbidden. Staff members are responsible for the use of their accounts, passwords, access and privileges. Any problems, which arise from the use of a staff member account, are the responsibility of the account holder. Use of an account by someone other than the registered account holder is expressly forbidden.
4. Staff members shall not use their personal cell phones, including messaging, or computers, including Internet access, for personal business during instructional time. Additionally, all staff members shall use good judgment when using any electronic device, whether it is for personal use on personal time or professional use during work time.
5. In consideration for the privilege of using the WBOCCSC Internet services and in consideration for having access to the information contained on it, staff members hereby release and hold harmless the WBOCCSC, its employees, and affiliates for claims of any nature arising from Internet use, or inability to use, the WBOCCSC Network and user account access assigned to said staff member.
6. Staff members must receive permission from the WBOCCSC Director of Technology before installing software or hardware to any corporation equipment. Staff members agree to abide by all copyright laws. Staff members agree to use caution and diligence when obtaining files from home or via email sources to avoid virus outbreaks and damages to the WBOCCSC Network.
7. Staff access to any use of the WBOCCSC Network is subject to such limitations as may be established by the Administration, which may change from time to time. Staff members understand their access may be terminated at any time.
8. Staff members shall do everything in their power to protect sensitive and confidential student data and conform to the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA).

All staff should be advised that access to the Internet may contain information which could be defamatory, abusive, obscene, profane, sexually oriented, threatening, harassing, racially offensive, or illegal. The WBOCCSC works diligently to protect students and staff from such content. However, the Corporation realizes staff members may inadvertently or accidentally come across this material and will not be held responsible in these cases. Questionable content should be reported to the Director of Technology.

By signing the attached form, staff members are granted Network access and agree to abide by this acceptable use policy.

PROFESSIONAL BOUNDARIES BETWEEN EMPLOYEES AND STUDENTS

BP-3190

All employees are expected to observe and maintain professional boundaries between themselves and students. This expectation applies during the regular school day and at all other times. Employees who observe behaviors such as those listed in this policy are required to promptly notify the school administration.

In the absence of a legitimate professional purpose, the following actions will be regarded as a violation of the professional boundaries that employees are expected to maintain with a student:

1. Giving gifts of a personal nature to a specific student unless its for a school event.
2. Going to a student's home when the student's parent/guardian is not present without first obtaining permission of administration.
3. Taking a student on an outing without obtaining permission of the student's parent/guardian and administration.
4. Giving a student a ride in the employee's personal vehicle when this is not an expectation of the employee's position, without permission of the student's parent/guardian and administration.
5. Using any means of communication (verbal, written, electronic) to discuss with a student a matter that does not pertain to the student's homework, class activity, school club or any other school-related event.
6. Allowing a specific student to engage in misconduct that is not tolerated from other students.
7. Discussing with a student the employee's problems that would normally be discussed with adults (such as; marital problems, medical conditions, personal information).
8. Making repeated physical contact with a student when the contact has no apparent professional purpose.
9. Telling sexual jokes to a student.
10. Discussing with a student sexual topics that are not related to a specific curriculum.
11. Showing sexually inappropriate materials or objects to a student.
12. Making any sexual advances – verbal, written or physical towards a student.
13. Engaging in sexual activity, a romantic relationship or dating a student.

The foregoing is a non-exclusive list of actions that, in the absence of a legitimate professional purpose, will be regarded as a violation of the professional boundaries that employees are expected to maintain. Any failure to maintain professional boundaries with a student will be regarded as a violation and as an act of misconduct that will result in the employee being subjected to disciplinary consequences up to and including suspension without pay and termination of employment.

GRADES AND GRADING

BP-5070

The Board of Education shall adopt a uniform grading system that shall be used by all teachers at each level of education. Timely and adequate communication of pupil progress shall be made to parents of all students. Formal grades will be sent out at each mid-term and each nine weeks.

The Board acknowledges that the awarding of grades and the decisions relative to promotion and retention of children are serious responsibilities of teachers and administrators. It is the Board's policy to support its professional staff in this professional duty. The Board feels that the professional staff can be depended upon to make all such decisions in the best interest of children. These decisions should be based on the premise that every teacher shall meet every student's needs and provide learning opportunities to allow the student to achieve as far as he/she is capable. The Board believes parents should be consulted and well informed at an early date when retention is advisable.

CRITERIA FOR DENIAL OF BOARD CONSIDERATION OF STUDENT DUE PROCESS
APPEALS

BP 6050

The Board of Education of the Western Boone County Community School Corporation shall decline to hear appeals of its expulsion officer's student due process case determinations in any of the following circumstances:

- A. The student has not been expelled or required to attend an alternative school.
- B. The expulsion officer has found that the student has engaged in prohibited conduct of the type enumerated below, unless a) the student has denied commission of the misconduct for which expulsion has been ordered and b) significant new evidence favorable to the student and not available at the time of the expulsion meeting has been discovered, and is specifically described in the request for appeal:
 1. Occupying any school building, school grounds, or part thereof with intent to deprive others of its use.
 2. Blocking the entrance or exits of any school building or corridor or room therein with intent to deprive others of lawful access to or from, or use of the building, corridor, or room.
 3. Setting fire to or substantially damaging any school building or property.
 4. Possession, firing, displaying, or threatening use of firearms, explosives, or other weapons on the school premises.
 5. Prevention of or attempting to prevent by physical act the convening or continued functioning of any school or educational function, or of any lawful meeting or assembly on school property.
 6. Causing or attempting to cause substantial damage to school property, stealing or attempting to steal school property of substantial value, or repeatedly damaging or stealing school property of small value.
 7. Intentionally causing or attempting to cause substantial damage to valuable private property, stealing or attempting to steal valuable private property, or repeatedly damaging or stealing private property.
 8. Intentionally causing or attempting to cause physical injury or intentionally behaving in such a way as to endanger the safety of any person, except where self-defense or reasonable action undertaken on the reasonable belief that it was necessary to protect some other person has been raised at the expulsion meeting as a defense to a finding of a violation of this provision.
 9. Threatening or intimidating any student or school employee for the purpose of, or with the intent of, obtaining money or anything of value from the student or school employee.

10. Except for approved school purposes, knowingly possessing, handling, or transmitting a knife or any other object that can reasonably be considered a weapon or looks like a weapon.
 11. Knowingly possessing, using, transmitting, or being affected by /of any narcotic drug, hallucinogenic drug, amphetamine, barbiturate, depressant, stimulant, cocaine, marijuana, anabolic steroid, look-a-like drug, alcoholic beverage, or intoxicant of any kind. Proper medical use of a prescription or nonprescription drug is not a violation of this subdivision.
 12. Engaging in the unlawful selling of a controlled substance or engaging in a criminal law violation that constitutes a danger to other students or constitutes an interference with school purposes or an educational function.
- C. The student has admitted the rule violation for which expulsion has been ordered, unless the appeal is limited to a challenge to the imposition of expulsion or the length of the expulsion imposed, and the expulsion officer has imposed a longer expulsion than is customarily imposed in similar cases.
- D. The length of the expulsion imposed is less than one semester or is the remainder of the current semester.

They also will encourage the development of student leaders by requiring detailed planning, budgeting and record keeping, and by encouraging all activities be carried through to a satisfactory completion.

SUPERVISION

BP - 6150

Students are under the supervision of the school authorities at all school sponsored functions such as athletic events, class parties, noon periods, after school activities on school grounds (i.e. time between dismissal of school and an athletic event later that day), et cetera.

The Board of Education is interested and legally responsible for all funds of the schools. This includes not only tax income but also activity income and expenditures. Each school at the beginning of each month shall submit a budget analysis of all extra-curricular accounts to the superintendent's office.

PREGNANCY

BP - 6170

Our schools are committed to the task of providing each student the opportunity to complete a high school education. It is pointed out to students that the added responsibility of parenthood may make it difficult, if not impossible, to follow all regulations.

In the event a student shall become pregnant, she shall notify the principal of her building or the school nurse before her condition becomes obvious. The principal shall then cause a conference to be held with the parents or the husband if the student is married. The conference shall be centered on the issue of continued attendance at school.

Should the student desire to remain in school, it shall be her responsibility to furnish a written statement from a licensed medical doctor that the student is able to continue her attendance without harm to herself or her unborn child. The student may re-enter when her physician will verify in writing that she is physically, emotionally, and mentally prepared to do so. Absences incurred due to maternity will be handled as any other absence. If a student is sixteen or seventeen years of age and decides to withdraw they must have an exit interview.

The school corporation shall not be held liable for injury to the student or her unborn child should the student decide to continue her attendance during pregnancy.

I am requesting permission to utilize existing revenue streams for the position of Varsity Assistant Track coach. The pay will be \$1,686 and replaces the Assistant Boy's Tennis coaching stipend, and utilizes \$300 from the Freshman Girl's Basketball coaching stipend. As we continue to look at our needs within the revenue streams we currently have, our track program has 62 athletes and is in need of bringing back this position. A third assistant staff member is needed for safety in supervision, and with several specialty events in track, there is a strong need for another coach. Coupled with the fact our Boy's Tennis program has averaged below 10 team members, and our Freshman Girls Basketball Team has not been in place for several years, I feel we need to shift funding to a third assistant track coach. With 62 athletes in track, there is a strong need for this position, and I believe if we can use existing funds, and there is a need, having the flexibility to move our ECA staff positions to where the needs are is both logical, and fiscally responsible.

Thanks for your consideration of this position and shifting of revenue streams already allocated for ECA positions.

I am requesting permission to utilize existing revenue streams to create the position of Youth Sports Coordinator. The pay will be \$2,100 and replaces the Freshman Girls Basketball coaching stipend. As part of the long term strategic plan and vision for our athletic department, one of our primary building blocks is our feeder system. In my two years on the job, I feel one of the areas we are weak in, and in need of much improvement, is a quality feeder program. In an effort to shore up this weakness, I feel we need to place someone in charge of leading the feeder program and working directly with our head coaches and being the liaison between them and our elementary programs.

I have attached a detailed job description of what the role of this position will be. Please keep in mind this is a new position and will evolve some as we move through this first year. This will be a regular ECA position and be treated like all of our other ECA positions. In essence, we need someone who will help take some of the youth level administrative responsibilities off of our head coaches as they must be able to focus on their varsity programs. As important, we must make certain the coaches who work at the younger levels are being properly trained and educated on how to coach at those levels.

I am concerned by how many coaches at the younger levels focus on winning at all cost, burn kids out and pick All Star teams when kids are 7 and 8 years old. Research is showing fewer kids wanting to continue their playing experience past the age of 13 because of their experiences at the younger levels. To better explain, in education we know how crucial the elementary years are to the development of our students. As an example, if kids do not learn how to properly read by third grade, many times they never recover. The same is true in athletics, but in a different light. If kids do not learn the proper fundamentals, or have a bad experience, the lasting impact of those experiences is hard to overcome. I want to make certain we are doing a better job of educating younger level coaches, and providing great experiences for our kids.

One of my major goals in the education process is to develop Core Covenants for our youth programs, (see example of HS, but same concept). Education based athletics has to be about teaching life lessons, but we must provide tools and resources to get our younger level coaches to critically think about why they are coaching. To properly educate our staff will take time, but the long term gains will pay major dividends. Also, I want to make sure our head coaches have the support needed to properly promote and run first class feeder programs. This position will allow us to better educate the younger level coaching staffs, provide better communication with our elementary principals, help to promote our camps and programs, create a structured and organized feeder system program, and most important help create more unification between our communities. In closing, I feel this position is vital for long term success, and will not cost any additional dollars to the corporation. Thank you for your time and consideration of this position.

Western Boone Youth Sports Coordinator – Job Description

- The preferred candidate will have knowledge of the methods and techniques of organizing groups into teams and leagues for various athletic and sports activities.

General Definition of Work

He or she will perform routine to difficult professional and administrative work in planning, organizing, implementing and supervising a comprehensive youth (grades K-6) athletic and sports program on a year-round basis. Work is performed under the supervision of the Director of Athletics.

Essential Functions/Typical Tasks

- He or she will work with our varsity head coaching staff to help direct a comprehensive youth sports program. He or she will meet on a bi-weekly or as needed basis with our head coaches to discuss how they want to run their youth leagues, camps, and plan promotional activities that promote our younger kids at varsity contests.
- He or she will run/coordinate our weekend basketball youth travel team programs for grades 4-8.
- He or she will be responsible for distributing all youth league information to our elementary schools, as well as making the flyers for camps and in season programs that are not school teams (i.e. 5th grade Granville Wells Girls Basketball). He or she will send out information to be placed in the local papers, radio, etc that help promote these programs.
- He or she will be the liaison to all youth programs that are not directly run by our head coaches (i.e. Youth Football League, Little League Baseball and Softball, YMCA, AAU Programs, etc).
- He or she will schedule and coordinate with the High School Athletic Director the use of athletic fields and gyms at various sites based on the needs of each head coach.
- He or she will meet with our elementary principals on a regular basis to help coordinate times when contact can be made with the students to help promote our camps and programs. Furthermore, this person will work with the elementary principals in coordinating meetings between the elementary coaching staff and the head coaches.
- Through fall, winter and spring seminars, he or she will help train and educate the elementary coaching staff, and all youth programs that want to use our facilities on how to coach at the younger levels. The purpose of the training is to explain the role our feeder programs have within the athletic department, and most important the importance of teaching proper fundamentals, sportsmanship and character based education. Winning at the elementary levels is not our priority.
- Other duties as assigned by the Athletic Director

Required Knowledge, Skills and Abilities

He or she must have a strong understanding of how to run a quality athletic feeder program. Having a vision that promotes making things fun, exciting, and being creative is an asset. The person must have the ability to relate well with coaches, parents, staff and kids. The ability to handle stress and manage and organize several tasks at a time is important. Furthermore, having skills in Microsoft Word, Excel, etc is essential. Previous or current head coaching experience is preferred.
